

The Fourth Industrial Revolution disrupts, fuses and blurs the lines between all kinds of previously discrete entities – physical, geographical, biological, digital, and cyberspace among them. We live in a world of communication and travel that encourages and enables cultural interaction, and increasing cosmopolitanism. Yet this age is also characterised by the resurgence of a narrow nationalism as people fear that their cultures and societies are being swamped by waves of immigrants from foreign countries, or by cosmopolitan, human-rights based ideas that circulate globally. The leaders of many nations now include explicit and implicit appeals to protect some version of national identity and culture. Is cosmopolitanism at odds with a clearly defined national identity? Does nationalism preclude internationalism? Is a firm sense of national identity necessary for an international outlook? What is the role of literature and the other arts in these debates? How helpful is "soft diplomacy" in dealings between nations?
